

## CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT TO FIRST FINANCE ELITE MUTUAL FUND SHAREHOLDERS



On behalf of the Board of Directors, I extend a warm welcome to you, our valued shareholders as we convene the 4th Annual General Meeting of First Finance Elite Mutual Fund PLC. My report will begin with a global economic overview, highlighting key events from the past year. Next, I will share insights into Ghana's economic performance during the same period. Finally, I will present a comprehensive review of the Fund's performance, showcasing its achievements and progress so far and end with the outlook for the next financial year, 2024.

DR. VICTOR DANQUAH BOARD CHAIRMAN

#### **KEY HIGHLIGHTS OF THE ECONOMY**

- Global economic activity saw an improvement in the first half of the year, driven by robust household consumption amid tighter labor markets, particularly in advanced economies.
- However, global activity decelerated in the second half of the year due to weakening manufacturing and services sectors. Despite these challenges, GDP growth remained robust by year-end in major economies like China and the USA.

#### **REVIEW OF GHANA'S ECONOMY**

The Ghana's economy expanded by 2.9% in 2023, significantly lower than the 3.8% recorded in the previous year, 2022. The Industrial sector contracted while the Agricultural and Services sectors contributed to the growth in GDP. Non-oil GDP growth was 3.3% in 2023, compared to 4.7% in 2022. Growth for the full year averaged 4.15% from 2014 to 2023, an all-time high compared to 8.10% in 2017 and a record low of 0.50% in 2020.

December 2023. In inflation rate declined significantly to 23.2% from 54.1% in December 2022, driven by decreases in food and non-food prices. Core inflation also slowed down. The central bank kept the benchmark interest rate at 30% in November 2023 expectation of а continuous in disinflation. The average benchmark policy rate for 2023 was 29.5%. Headline inflation is projected to decline to 13-17% by end-2024 and return to the target range of 6-10% by 2025.

#### **FUND PERORMANCE**

Fund's The total assets under management decreased by 17.5% to 2023, GH¢663,472 in due mark-to-market valuation losses. The number of outstanding shares also dropped by 10% to 487,109. Despite this, the Fund's share price rose to GH¢1.3301, and it delivered a 16.9% return for shareholders in 2023, outperforming the previous year's 14.4% return. However, cumulative returns since inception fell to 33.0% due to market volatility and valuation losses.

### **ECONOMIC REVIEW**

#### THE GLOBAL ECONOMY

Rising inflationary pressures and looming threat of recession painted an uncertain outlook for the global economy at the start of the year 2023 amid the anticipated withdrawal of pandemic-era fiscal support for households and businesses, the temporary boost from China's reopening after COVID-19 lockdowns, a weakening manufacturing sector, and both actual and anticipated monetary policy tightening.

Notwithstanding these anticipated challenges, global economic activities improved in the first half of the year, underpinned by strong household consumption amid tight labor markets in advanced economies, a robust services sector, the easing of supply chain constraints, and a recovery in real incomes due to disinflation.

However, in the latter half of the year, global activity slowed, predominantly in the manufacturing and services sectors. Nonetheless, some major economies, including China and the USA, ended the year with strong GDP growth. Estimates from by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) showed that the world economy grew by 3.1 percent; higher than projected but slightly below the 3.5 percent recorded in 2022.

#### THE LOCAL ECONOMY


The Ghana's economy expanded by 2.9% in 2023, significantly lower than the 3.8% recorded in the previous year, 2022. The Industrial sector contracted while the Agricultural and Services sectors contributed to the growth in GDP. The Services sector advanced with 45.6% compared to 45.6% in the previous year, 2022.

This was followed by Industry with 31.7% share, against 33.6% in 2022, while the share of Agriculture sector increased marginally to 22.7%, compared to 20.8% in the same period, 2022. Non-oil GDP growth was 3.3% in 2023, compared to 4.7% in 2022. Growth for the full year averaged 4.15% from 2014 to 2023, an all-time high compared to 8.10% in 2017 and a record low of 0.50% in 2020.

supporting a wide decline in prices, base effects compared to the prior year and aggressive monetary policy tightening by the central bank.

#### **INTEREST RATES**

The Central bank during its November 2023 meeting stayed the benchmark interest rate at a record level of 30% in line market forecasts, on expectation of continuous



#### **CONSUMER PRICE INFLATION (CPI)**

Headline inflation declined sharply to 23.2 per cent in December 2023, from 54.1 per cent recorded the prior year, December 2022 driven by easing food (28.7% vs 59.7% in 2022) and non-food prices (18.7% vs 49.9% in 2022) . Core inflation also slowed significantly

disinflation trend; easing to around 13% to 17% by the end of 2024, before gradually trending back to within the medium term target range of 6% to 10% by 2025. Overall, the benchmark policy rate closed the year 2023 at an average rate of 29.5%.





#### **EXCHANGE RATE**

The local currency remained fairly stable on the interbank currency market on the back of a tighter monetary policy stance by the Central bank. Moreover, inflows from the IMF's Extended Credit Facility, the Bank of Ghana's Domestic

Gold Purchase Programme among others supported the stability of the cedi. Cumulatively, the cedi depreciated by 27.8% against the US dollar (vs 29.9% in 2022) and 31.9% (vs 21.2% in 2022), 30.3% (vs 25.3% in 2022) against the British pound and the Euro respectively.

#### **FIXED INCOME MARKET IN 2023**

Interest rates on the fixed income trended market downwards. particular at the back end of the yield curve within the year 2023 reflecting an ease in the inflationary pressures. The 91-Day and 182-Day Treasury bill rates slipped to 29.39% and 31.70%, respectively, at the last auction, from 35.48% and 36.23% respectively at the end of year 2022. Similarly, the rate on the 364-Day instrument declined to close at 32.97% in December 2023 from 36.06% recorded in prior the year. On the secondary market, witnessed Treasury bond yields upward pressures fueled by the general risks associated with the Domestic Debt Exchange Programme (DDEP) bonds amid declining interest rates on the market. Overall, trading activities on the Ghana Fixed income Market

#### **EQUITY MARKET IN 2023**

Trading activities on the local bourse ended the year recording mixed outturn for investors. The GSE-Composite Index (GSE-CI) closed at 3,130.23 points, representing 28.08% year-to-date returns supported by improved returns on equities from agriculture, manufacturing, distribution and food and beverage sectors. The improved performance of the GSE-CI suggests buy-side pressures in the year 2023. However, **GSE-Financial** Stocks Index finished the year bearish at 1,901.57 points, representing a year-to-date loss of 7.4% compared to a 4.6% loss

#### **MOVEMENTS IN AUM**


At the close of the 2023 financial year, total funds under management stood at GH¢ 663,472, a significant decline from the GH¢ 804,704 recorded in the previous year. The drop in the Fund's size results is as а of the mark-to-market (Fair Value) valuation losses experienced within the year. Number of shares outstanding ended the year at 487,109, a 10% down from the previous year.

**FUND PRICE AND RETURNS** 

The Fund's price per shareincreased to GH¢1.3301 at the year end, up from

GH¢1.1379 recorded for the year open at the start of the implementation of mark-to-market valuation the methodology in line with regulatory directive in November 2022. Despite the volatilities in returns witnessed within the period. the Fund returned 16.9%for shareholders, compared to 14.40% for 2022. However, cumulative returns from inception declined from 51.9% at the end of the 2022 financial year to close 2023 at 33.0% weighed by the mark-to-market losses.



### **OUTLOOK AND STRATEGY FOR 2024**

Ghana's medium-term growth outlook remains positive. GDP growth is projected to rise to 3.4% and 4.3% in 2024 and 2025 respectively, led by the Industrial and Services sectors on the supply side and private consumption and investment on the demand side. Inflation is expected to remain outside the Central bank's bound of 8±2 at 20.9% in 2024 and 11.1% in 2025. The fiscal deficit is projected to widen slightly to 4.9% in 2024 before narrowing to 4.2% in 2025 as fiscal consolidation efforts continue. The current account deficit is expected to widen to 1.9% in 2024 and 2.3% in 2025 according to report by the African Development Bank Group.

Our strategy involves boosting portfolio resilience by investing in securities that can weather market fluctuations and identifying new opportunities in high-growth sectors. The Fund is targeted at middle income earners who want to invest on monthly basis in order to meet education and retirement needs and other medium to long term objectives such as home acquisition, home improvements and vacation.

the context of the audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. We have determined the following as a key audit matter.

## DOMESTIC DEBT EXCHANGE PROGRAM

The Government of Ghana rolled out a Debt Exchange Program for holders of Domestic Notes and bonds, E.S.L.A Plc. and Daakye Trust Plc. bonds of which the Fund fully participated by exchanging all its existing Government of Ghana bonds for new bonds with new terms (tenor and interest rates) under the program. The total value of bonds exchanged under the program amounted GH¢519,100.

The impact of the Debt exchange program is significant to the Fund as it affects the valuation, classification, and financial performance of the Fund's financial assets. We have therefore determined the debt exchange program as a key audit matter.

## HOW THE MATTER WAS ADDRESSED IN OUR AUDIT

Our audit procedures included the following;

- 1. We reviewed the financial terms of the exchanged bonds to determine whether the modifications to the cashflows of the old bonds were substantial enough to lead to the derecognition of the old bonds and to check that the derecognition was done as required by IFRS 9.
- 2. We evaluated the methodology used by the scheme to determine the value of the old bonds being exchanged for the new ones
- 3. Review the balances on the new bonds in the scheme's records to ensure that at initial recognition, the new bonds were measured at fair value and confirmed the existence of the new bonds to their values on the Central Securities Depository (CSD) report
- 4. Reviewed the scheme's records to ensure that the financial terms of the new bonds were correctly stated.

#### 1. REPORTING ENTITY

First Finance Elite Mutual Fund Plc is a mutual fund investment company whose primary objective is to obtain contributions from members and invest same for their benefit. First Finance Elite Mutual Fund Plc is a limited liability company and is incorporated and domiciled in the Republic of Ghana. The address and registered office of the company can be found on page 2 of the financial statements.

The Fund was established in 9 July 2018 and operates in accordance with the Unit Trust and Mutual Fund Regulation (L.I.1695). The Fund shall be marketed as "First Finance Elite Mutual Fund Plc", which means it will invest in a combination of listed equities, fixed income securities, as well as alternatives investments to achieve its investment objective. The investment activities shall be managed by First Finance Company Limited.

#### 2. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

#### (a) Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Unit Trust and Mutual Funds Regulations, 2001 (L.I. 1695) and comply with the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

## (b) Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Ghana cedi, which is the Fund's functional currency. All amounts have been stated in full.

## (c) Use of estimates and judgement

financial preparing these Unit Trust's statements. the management has made judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of liabilities. assets. income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

## 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following principal accounting policies have been consistently applied during the year in the preparation of the Mutual Fund's financial statements.

## (a) Investments income recognition

Interest income, including interest income from non-derivative financial assets at Fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), are recognised in profit or loss, using effective interest method. The effective interest is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments or

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the Company's statement of financial position when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

#### (i) Financial assets

All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the marketplace.

All recognised financial assets are measured subsequently in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

#### Classification of Financial Assets

Debt instruments that meet the following conditions are measured subsequently at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Debt instruments that meet the following conditions are measured subsequently at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI):

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets; and
- the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

By default, all other financial assets are measured subsequently at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL). Despite the foregoing, the Company may make the following irrevocable election/designation at initial recognition of a financial asset:

- the Company may irrevocably elect to present subsequent changes in fair value of an equity investment in other comprehensive income if certain criteria are met; and
- the Company may irrevocably designate a debt investment that meets the amortised cost or FVTOCI criteria as measured at FVTPL if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch.

- a. Amortised cost and effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a debt instrument and of allocating interest income over the relevant period. For financial assets other than purchased or originated credit-impaired financial assets (i.e. assets that are credit-impaired on initial recognition), the effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future receipts (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate. transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) excluding expected credit losses, through the expected life of the debt instrument, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the gross carrying amount of the debt instrument on initial recognition. For purchased originated credit-impaired financial credit adjusted effective assets, a rate interest is calculated by discounting the estimated future

cash flows, including expected credit losses, to the amortised cost of the debt instrument on initial recognition.

The amortised cost of a financial asset is the amount at which the financial is measured at initial asset recognition minus the principal repayments, plus the cumulative amortisation using the effective interest method of any difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount, adjusted for any loss allowance. The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is the amortised cost of a financial asset before adjusting for any loss allowance.

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method for debt instruments measured subsequently at amortised cost and at FVTOCI. For financial assets other than purchased originated credit-impaired or financial assets, interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset, except for financial assets that have subsequently creditbecome impaired. For financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired, interest income is

recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset. If, in subsequent reporting periods, the credit risk on the credit-impaired financial instrument improves so that the financial is asset no **longer** credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset.

For purchased originated or credit-impaired financial assets, the Company recognises interest income applying the credit-adjusted effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset initial recognition. calculation does not revert to the gross basis even if the credit risk of the financial asset subsequently improves so that the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired.

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss and is included in the "finance income – interest income" line item.

 b. Debt instruments classified as at FVTOCI

Corporate bonds held by the Company are classified as at FVTOCI. Fair value is determined in the

manner described in note 3(d)iii. The corporate bonds are initially measured fair value plus at transaction costs. Subsequently, changes in the carrying amount of these corporate bonds as a result of foreign exchange gains and losses, impairment gains or losses, and interest income calculated using the effective interest method are recognised in profit or loss. The amounts that are recognised in profit or loss are the same as the amounts that would have been recognised in profit or loss if these corporate bonds had been measured at amortised cost. All other changes in the carrying amount of these corporate bonds are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of investments revaluation reserve. When these corporate bonds are derecognised, the cumulative gains or losses previously recognised in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss.

- c. Equity instruments designated as at FVTOCI

On initial recognition, the Company may make an irrevocable election (on an instrument-by-instrument basis) to designate investments in equity instruments as at FVTOCI. Designation at FVTOCI is not permitted if the equity investment is held for trading or if it is contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination.

A financial asset is held for trading if:

- it has been acquired principally for the purpose of selling it in the near term; or
- on initial recognition it is part of a portfolio of identified financial instruments that the Company manages together and has evidence of a recent actual pattern of short-term profit-taking; or
- it is a derivative (except for a derivative that is a financial guarantee contract or a designated and effective hedging instrument).

Investments in equity instruments at FVTOCI are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at fair value with gains and losses arising from changes in fair value recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the investments

revaluation reserve. The cumulative gain or loss is not to be reclassified to profit or loss on disposal of the equity investments, instead, it is transferred to retained earnings.

Dividends on these investments in equity instruments are recognised in profit or loss in accordance with IFRS 9, unless the dividends clearly represent a recovery of part of the cost of the investment. Dividends are included in the 'finance income' line item in profit or loss.

The Company has designated all investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading as at FVTOCI on initial application of IFRS 9.

#### d. Financial assets at FVTPL

Financial assets that do not meet the criteria for being measured at amortised cost or FVTOCI are measured at FVTPL. Specifically:

• Investments in equity instruments are classified as at FVTPL, unless the Company designates an equity investment that is neither held for trading nor a contingent consideration arising from a business combination as at FVTOCI on initial recognition.

Debt instruments that do not meet the amortised cost criteria or the FVTOCI criteria are classified as at FVTPL. In addition, debt instruments that meet either the amortised cost criteria or the FVTOCI criteria may be designated as at FVTPL upon initial recognition if such designation eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement recognition or inconsistency (so called 'accounting mismatch') that would arise from measuring assets or liabilities or recognising the gains and losses on different them on bases. The Company has not designated any debt instruments as at FVTPL.

Financial assets at **FVTPL** measured at fair value at the end of each reporting period, with any fair value gains or losses recognised in profit or loss to the extent that they are not part of a designated hedging relationship. The net gain or loss recognised in profit or loss includes any dividend or interest earned on the financial asset and is included in the 'other gains and losses' line item. Fair value is determined in the manner described in note 3(d)iii

- for debt instruments measured at FVTOCI that are not part of a designated hedging relationship. exchange differences on the amortised cost of the debt instrument are recognised in profit or loss in the 'other gains and losses' line item. Other exchange differences recognised in other comprehensive income in the investments revaluation reserve;
- for financial assets measured at FVTPL that are not part of a designated hedging relationship, exchange differences are recognised in profit or loss in the 'other gains and losses' line item; and

• for equity instruments measured at FVTOCI, exchange differences are recognised in other comprehensive income in the investments revaluation reserve.

See hedge accounting policy regarding the recognition of exchange differences where the foreign currency risk.

#### Impairment of financial assets

The Company recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses (ECL) on investments in debt instruments that are measured at amortised cost or at FVTOCI, lease receivables, trade receivables and contract assets, as well as on financial guarantee contracts. The amount of expected credit losses is updated at date reporting to reflect changes in credit risk since initial recognition of the respective financial instrument.

The Company always recognises lifetime ECL for trade receivables, contract assets and lease receivables. The expected credit losses on these financial assets are estimated using a provision matrix based on the Company's historical credit loss

experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current as well as the forecast direction of conditions at the reporting date, including time value of money where appropriate.

For all other financial instruments, the Company recognises lifetime ECL when there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition. However, if the credit risk on the financial instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Company measures the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to 12-month ECL.

Lifetime ECL represents the expected credit losses that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument. In contrast, 12-month ECL represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events on a financial instrument that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date.

- i. Significant increase in credit risk

In assessing whether the credit risk financial instrument increased significantly since initial recognition, the Company compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument at the date of initial recognition. In making this assessment, the Company considers both quantitative and qualitative information that is reasonable and supportable. including historical experience and forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort. Forward-looking information considered includes the future prospects of the industries in which Company's debtors the operate. from obtained economic expert financial reports, analysts, governmental relevant bodies, think-tanks other similar and organisations, as well as consideration of various external sources of actual and forecast economic information that relate to the Company's core operations.

In particular, the following information is taken into account when assessing whether credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition:

- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the financial instrument's external (if available) or internal credit rating;
- significant deterioration in external market indicators of credit risk for a particular financial instrument, e.g. a significant increase in the credit spread, the credit default swap prices for the debtor, or the length of time or the extent to which the fair value of a financial asset has been less than its amortised cost;
- existing or forecast adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations;
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the operating results of the debtor;
- significant increases in credit risk on other financial instruments of the same debtor:

• an actual or expected significant adverse change in the regulatory, economic, or technological environment of the debtor that results in a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations.

Irrespective of the outcome of the above assessment, the Company presumes that the credit risk on a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due, unless the Company has reasonable and supportable information that demonstrates otherwise.

Despite the foregoing, the Company assumes that the credit risk on a financial instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition if the financial instrument is determined to have low credit risk at the reporting date. A financial instrument is determined to have low credit risk if:

- 1. The financial instrument has a low risk of default,
- 2. The debtor has a strong capacity to meet its contractual cash flow obligations in the near term, and
- 3. Adverse changes in economic

and business conditions in the longer term may, but will not necessarily, reduce the ability of the borrower to fulfil its contractual cash flow obligations.

The Company considers a financial asset to have low credit risk when the asset has external credit rating of 'investment grade' in accordance with the globally understood definition or if an external rating is not available, the asset has an internal rating of 'performing'. Performing means that the counterparty has a strong financial position and there is no past due amounts.

For financial guarantee contracts, the date that the Company becomes a party to the irrevocable commitment is considered to be the date of initial recognition for the purposes of assessing the financial instrument for impairment.

In assessing whether there has been a significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition of a financial guarantee contracts, the Company considers the changes in the risk that the specified debtor will default on the contract.

The Company regularly monitors the effectiveness of the criteria used to identify whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk and revises them as appropriate to ensure that the criteria is capable identifying significant increase in credit risk before the amount becomes past due.

#### ii. Definition of default

The Company considers the following as constituting an event of default for internal credit risk management purposes as historical experience indicates that financial assets that meet either of the following criteria are generally not recoverable:

- when there is a breach of financial covenants by the debtor; or
- information developed internally or obtained from external sources indicates that the debtor is unlikely to pay its creditors, including the Company, in full (without taking into account any collateral held by the Company).

Irrespective of the above analysis, the Company considers that default has

occurred when a financial asset is more than 90 days past due unless the Company has reasonable and supportable information to demonstrate that a more lagging default criterion is more appropriate.

## iii. Credit-impaired financial assets

A financial asset is credit-impaired when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of that financial asset have occurred. Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes observable data about the following events:

- 1. significant financial difficulty of the issuer or the borrower;
- 2. a breach of contract, such as a default or past due event;
- 3. the lender(s) of the borrower, for economic or contractual reasons relating to the borrower's financial difficulty, having granted to the borrower a concession(s) that the lender(s) would not otherwise consider:
- 4. it is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; or

5. the disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties.

- iv. Write-off policy

The Company writes off a financial asset when there is information indicating that the debtor is in severe financial difficulty and there is no realistic prospect of recovery, e.g. when the debtor has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings, or in the case of trade receivables, when the amounts are over two years past due, whichever occurs sooner. Financial assets written off may still be subject to enforcement activities under the Company's recovery procedures. taking into account legal advice where appropriate. Any recoveries made are recognised in profit or loss.

## v. Measurement and recognition of expected credit losses

The measurement of expected credit losses is a function of the probability of default, loss given default (i.e. the magnitude of the loss if there is a

default) and the exposure at default. The assessment of the probability of default and loss given default is based data historical adjusted forward-looking information as described above. As for the exposure at default, for financial assets, this is represented by the assets' gross carrying amount at the reporting date: for financial quarantee contracts, the exposure includes the amount drawn down as at the reporting date, together with any additional amounts expected to be drawn down in the future by default date determined based on historical trend, the Company's understanding of the specific future financing needs of the debtors, and other relevant forward-looking information.

For financial assets, the expected credit loss is estimated as the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Company in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Company expects to receive, discounted at the original effective interest rate. For a lease receivable, the cash flows used for determining the expected credit losses is consistent with the cash flows used in measuring the lease receivable in accordance with IAS 17 Leases.

For a financial guarantee contract, as the Company is required to make payments only in the event of a default by the debtor in accordance with the terms of the instrument that is guaranteed, the expected loss allowance is the expected payments to reimburse the holder for a credit loss that it incurs less any amounts that the Company expects to receive from the holder, the debtor or any other party.

If the Company has measured the loss allowance for a financial instrument at an amount equal to lifetime ECL in the previous reporting period, but determines at the current reporting date that the conditions for lifetime ECL are no longer met, the Company measures the loss allowance at an amount equal to 12-month ECL at the current reporting date, except for assets for which simplified approach was used.

The Company recognises an impairment gain or loss in profit or loss for all financial instruments with a corresponding adjustment to their carrying amount through a loss allowance account, except for investments in debt instruments that are measured at FVTOCI, for which the loss allowance is recognised in

If the Company neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership continues control to transferred asset. the Company recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the Company retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset. Company continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for proceeds received.

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the the asset's difference between carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss. In addition, on derecognition of an investment in a debt instrument classified FVTOCI. as at cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investment's revaluation reserve is reclassified to profit or loss. In contrast, derecognition of an investment in instrument equity which the Company has elected on initial recognition to measure at FVTOCI, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investment's revaluation reserve is not reclassified to profit or loss, but is transferred to retained earnings.

Classification as debt or equity

Debt and equity instruments are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

Repurchase of the Company's own equity instruments is recognised and deducted directly in equity. No gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss on the purchase, sale, issue or cancellation of the Company's own equity instruments.

Compound instruments

The component parts of convertible loan notes issued by the Company are classified separately as financial liabilities and equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument. A conversion option that will be settled by the exchange of a fixed amount of cash or another financial asset for a fixed number of the Company's equity own instruments is an equity instrument.

At the date of issue, the fair value of the liability component is estimated using the prevailing market interest rate for a similar non-convertible instrument. This amount is recorded as a liability on an amortised cost basis using the effective interest method until extinguished upon conversion or at the instrument's maturity date.

The conversion option classified as equity is determined by deducting the amount of the liability component from the fair value of the compound instrument as a whole. In addition, the conversion classified as equity will remain in equity until the conversion option is exercised, in which case, the balance recognised in equity will transferred to share premium/other equity. Where the conversion option remains unexercised at the maturity date of the convertible loan note, the balance recognised in equity will be transferred to retained profits/other equity. Transaction costs relating to the liability component are included in the carrying amount of the liability component and are amortised over the lives of the convertible loan notes using the effective interest method.

#### i. Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method or at FVTPL. However, financial liabilities that arise when a transfer of a financial asset does not qualify for derecognition when the or continuing involvement approach applies, and financial guarantee contracts issued by the Company, are measured in accordance with the specific accounting policies set out below.

Financial liabilities at FVTPL

Financial liabilities are classified as at FVTPL when the financial liability is (i) contingent consideration of an acquirer in a business combination, (ii) held for trading or (iii) it is designated as at FVTPL.

A financial liability is classified as held for trading if:

- it has been acquired principally for the purpose of repurchasing it in the near term; or
- on initial recognition it is part of a portfolio of identified financial instruments that the Company manages together and has a recent actual pattern of short-term profit-taking; or
- it is a derivative, except for a derivative that is a financial guarantee contract or a designated and effective hedging instrument.

A financial liability other than a financial liability held for trading or contingent consideration of an acquirer in a business combination may be designated as at FVTPL upon initial recognition if:

• such designation eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency that would otherwise arise; or

The net gain or loss recognised in profit or loss incorporates any interest paid on the financial liability and is included in the 'other gains and losses' line item in profit or loss.

However, for financial liabilities that are designated as at FVTPL, the amount of change in the fair value of the financial liability that is attributable to changes in the credit risk of that liability is recognised in other comprehensive income, unless the recognition of the effects of changes in the liability's credit risk in other comprehensive income would create or enlarge an accounting mismatch in profit or loss.

The remaining amount of change in the fair value of liability is recognised in profit or loss. Changes in fair value attributable to a financial liability's credit risk that are recognised in other comprehensive income are subsequently reclassified to profit or loss; instead, they are transferred to retained earnings derecognition of the financial liability. Gains or losses on financial guarantee contracts issued by the Company that are designated by the Company as at FVTPL are recognised in profit or loss. The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction and other premiums discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the amortised cost of a financial liability. **Financial** quarantee contract liabilities

A financial guarantee contract is a contract that requires the issuer to make specified payments to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because a specified debtor fails to make payments when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument.

For those which are designated as a hedging instrument for a hedge of foreign currency risk, foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in other comprehensive accumulated income and in а separate component of equity.

The fair value of financial liabilities denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate at the end of the reporting period. For financial liabilities that are measured as at FVTPL, the foreign exchange component forms part of the fair value gains or losses and is recognised in profit or loss for

## (iii) Financial Instrument Fair Valuation

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under IFRS 13 are described as follows:

Level 1:- Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Scheme has the ability to access.

Level 2:- Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;

(e) Derivative Financial Statements and Hedging Activities

Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value on the date that a derivative contract is entered into, and are subsequently remeasured at their fair value at each reporting date. The method of recognising the resulting gain or loss depends on whether the derivative is designated as a hedging instrument and, if so, the nature of the

item being hedged. The Company uses foreign currency forward exchange contracts to limit its exposure to foreign exchange risk on highly probable forecast foreign currency sales transactions. The designates Company these derivatives as hedges - that is, a hedge of foreign exchange risk associated highly probably with forecast sales transactions.

The Company designates and documents, at the inception of a hedging transaction, the hedging relationship so that the risk being hedged, the hedged item and the hedging instrument are clearly identified and the risk in the hedged item is the risk being hedged with the hedging instrument.

Hedge accounting is only applied when the Company expects the derivative financial instrument to be highly effective in offsetting the designated hedged foreign currency risk associated with the hedged item.

The full fair value of a hedging derivative is classified as a non-current asset or liability where the remaining maturity of the hedged item is more than 12 months, and as a current asset or liability where the remaining maturity of the hedged

Amounts recognised in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss in the periods when the forecast sales take place and are included within 'other gains/(losses) – net'.

When a foreign currency forward exchange contract expires or is sold, or when a hedge no longer meets the criteria for hedge accounting, any cumulative gain or loss existing in equity at that time remains in equity and is recognised when the forecast transaction ultimately affects profit or loss. When a forecast transaction is no longer expected to occur, cumulative gain or loss that was recognised in other comprehensive income is immediately transferred to profit within 'other or loss gains/(losses) - net'.

#### (f) Foreign Currency

Transactions in foreign currencies during the period are converted into cedis at exchange rates ruling at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into cedis at exchange rates ruling at the year-end. financial Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies that are measured at fair value are retranslated into cedis at the exchange rates at the date on which the fair value was determined. Foreign currency differences arising on retranslation are recognised in profit or loss as net foreign exchange losses, except for those arising on financial instruments at FVTPL, which are recognised as a component of net gains from financial instruments at FVTPL.

#### (a) Transfer values

Transfer values represent the capital sums paid to and from the Unit Trusts on the basis of when the member liability is accepted or discharged.

# 4. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the Company's policies, which accounting described in note 3, the Directors are required make judgments, to estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates underlying and assumptions are reviewed on ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

#### 5. KEY CONTRACTORS

#### a. Fund Managers

The Directors of the Fund appointed First Finance Company Limited, an investment management company incorporated in Ghana and duly licensed by the Security Exchange Commission of Ghana to implement the investment strategy and objectives as stated in the Fund's investment management policy Under manual. that investment management agreement, Finance Company Limited receives a management fee at an annual rate of 2.5% of the asset net value attributable to members of the Fund. management fees incurred during the vear amounted GH¢18,819. Included in the payables as at 31 December 2023 were fund management fees payable of GH¢5,089.

#### b. Fund Custodians

Under the custody agreement, the Custodian receives a custodian fee at an annual rate of 0.22% of the net asset value attributable to members of the Fund. The Custodian fees charged during the year amounted to GH¢1,656. Included in the payables as at 31 December 2023 were custodian fees payable of GH¢104.

#### (a). Asset/Portfolio/Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that counterparties (i.e. financial institutions and companies) in which the Fund's assets are invested will fail to discharge their obligations or commitments to the Fund, resulting in a financial loss to the Fund.

The Scheme's policy over credit risk is to minimise its exposure to counterparties with perceived higher risk of default by dealing only with counterparties that meets the standards set out in the SEC guidelines and the Fund's investment policy statement.

#### (b). Liquidity risk

#### (e) Equity Price risk

Listed equity securities are susceptible to market price risk from uncertainties arising about future values of the investment securities. The Scheme's policy over equity price risk is to minimise its exposure to equities and only deal equities with that meets the standards set in the **SEC** out quidelines the Scheme's and investment policy statement. Keen attention is paid to the equity market to realize capital gains on equity securities.

#### (f) Interest Rate risk

Interest risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market The investment interest rates. managers advise the Trustees on the appropriate balance of the portfolio between equity, fixed rate interest, variable and rate interest investments.
